You helped Lynn make valuable connections throughout the pandemic

LYNN THORNE, VOLUNTEER TRANSPORTATION DRIVER SINCE 2006

Why did Lynn become a volunteer driver?

"I wanted to be of help. I had the time and a car. I was not working full time anymore. I wanted the opportunity to meet people."

What is Lynn's favourite thing about driving?

"It's the people. You meet all kinds. I feel very privileged and fortunate to have been able to provide transportation services since the start of Covid. For many clients, the need remained through Covid restrictions, whether it be to dialysis, cancer treatment or pain clinic."

What was it like to volunteer during the early days of the pandemic?

"At times it was challenging to keep up and keep everything straight. But, I always felt supported from the VON staff and well supplied with PPE. All volunteers are required to self-screen every day before providing services to clients and clients are required to screen too. Clients are usually travelling without a family member or caregiver due to Covid-19 visitor restrictions, and are going to treatment or surgery alone without family support.

What is it like for the clients you serve?

"In many instances, they are getting life altering news and diagnosis on their own, and the role of the driver has become all of the more supportive to your passenger. Taking someone for six weeks chemo treatment, you are on a journey with them. It can range from being called in from your car to sit for 30 minutes in the recovery room with someone after dental surgery, to being told on your ride back home, that their cancer is now stage four and they are stopping all treatment immediately. When these things happen, it definitely has an effect on you, being present in someone's life at the moment of need.' What has it been like for you as a volunteer this past year and half?

"It certainly gives you that intense, personal connection. You may not know or see them again after that surgery or treatment, but you do think about them and they are in your thoughts. I recall picking up several clients, and being told it was the first time that they had been out of their apartment in 9 or 10 months. They said it was a joy to have a conversation, to see the countryside and get a breath of fresh air. Even though that was a March, a very cold wintery day.

What would I say to someone who wants to be a volunteer driver?

"I would say, give it a try. There is no pressure to give more than you can. It's on your schedule. People are so appreciative and it's humbling that a seemingly small act can have on another's life."

DR. KAREN FRYER, VON SAKURA HOUSE MEDICAL DIRECTOR SINCE 2009

What was it like at Sakura House during the early days of the pandemic?

"The pandemic was definitely one of our greatest challenges but our team carried on with incredible courage and resiliency and I am incredibly grateful to them. At the very beginning of the pandemic there was a lot of apprehension from patients, families, staff and volunteers - and a lot of unknowns, as the science was catching up to everything we were doing. Our goal was to balance the rules with the safety of everyone. For those first couple of months, I covered Sakura by myself and would go in on the weekends to minimize the number of new people on-site. I had hoped it would provide some continuity for everyone. We all really had to roll with the changes and everyone pitched in to make it work."



What were some of the biggest challenges?

"I remember PPE was in short supply in the early days.

And, we lost our volunteers as they couldn't come in to cover their regular duties. It was a big loss for our patients as they are the ones who provide that extra TLC. But, we were fortunate to have extra staff from VON redeployed to Sakura to continue this important care. We also had to close off most of the main house to patients and families so the communal aspect has changed considerably. But, the fresh baking and the soups are still there and the staff make the most of things and make it as "homey" as possible."

What was the hardest part of your job?

"I would say the most heartbreaking aspect of the pandemic was having to limit visitors. Seeing patients choose only one visitor when they were dying. That was the most difficult for me - having to make those decisions to balance the safety of everyone. It will be something I will never forget. And, continues to be a struggle. It continues to be heartbreaking to put limits on visitors. It's necessary at the moment but it certainly has been the hardest point through all of this."

What are your reflections after a year and half into the pandemic?

Thankfully, after 16 months, we are very fortunate to keep Covid out of the hospice throughout the pandemic and continue to do so. I commend the staff for being so diligent with their PPE. It was all those preventative measures and an element of luck I think that has kept it out! I know that it's been a tough year for our entire community but as we see some light at the end of the tunnel, this time of unease and discomfort has shown us many moments of courage and resiliency. Many of these moments I have witnessed first-hand at Sakura as we navigated the pandemic.

What hasn't changed during the pandemic?

"Sakura House continues to provide excellent care. Everyone who works or volunteers at Sakura House has chosen to be there. It's not just a job for most of us. We bring a high level of skill and we bring a lot of heart and compassion to the work we do. Covid aside, the facilities are lovely and it is much more home-like for families. It can be scary for families when they first arrive at Sakura House. And, they expect it be sad. But they soon realize that there is a lot of life and laughter around them. We make the most of the life that the patients have."

On December 10th, 2020 we lit up Sakura House for the first time in our 11 year history.

We celebrated the memory of those who have died and honoured those close to our hearts. Our virtual event had musical performances, a memorial ceremony and then we turned on the holiday lights at Sakura House for the first time ever.

We are so grateful to more than 550 donors who helped us raise \$108,224 for Sakura House. Thank you for your generous donations!

All donations to this event went to the Sakura House Recovery Fund. The Sakura House Recovery Fund was established to help cover the increased costs due to the pandemic, such as extra nursing care, extra cleaning, and other highest needs. These donations also helped with the loss in memorial donations due to changes in funerals and from the cancellation of our Handbags for Hospice fundraiser.
